Policy

student behavior	As students in a technical program are preparing for a professional career, all students are expected to conduct themselves, in both manner and dress, as professionals. Attendance	Students are required to attend scheduled lectures and to work on class and lab/field assignments as scheduled by the professor. In this case, student's absence will be counted as unexcused and will receive a zero for any assignments due. If a student must miss a scheduled class meeting due to an acceptable, verifiable time conflict, he/she must resolve the time conflict prior to class.
